Oscar L. Weinrich. Born October 25, 1879; Initiated into the Elks, May 7, 1907; Died July 11, 1947.

James Moir. Born March 29, 1867; Initiated into the Elks, (no record); Died July 23, 1947.

### L-Kee-Ta Formally Dedicated

A very worthwhile thing has been accomplished by B.P.O.E. No. 84. After months of working and planning the new, Elk sponsored, Girl Scout Camp west of town has become a reality. All local Elks can be justly proud of this fine development. It certainly fits in fine with the increased activity and interest that has been shown of late in connection with the curbing of juvenile delinquency.

The Girl Scout Camp was officially named L-Kee-Ta in dedication ceremonies July 20 at the site 14 miles northwest of Burlington on the Long Creek road.

The dedication was attended by a large crowd and Paul Fulton, Exalted Ruler of the Burlington Elks club, presented the organization with the campsite.

While the Elks provided the site for the camp, Fulton said the organization does not look upon the venture as a gift or sponsorship.

"This is an investment in Americanism," said Fulton, "an investment in the future of our country and our young people. If it fails, the title reverts to the Elks for re-investment."

Rev. Glenn Sawdon, rector of Christ Episcopal church, gave the invocation, Mayor Verle McBride gave a short talk. Mrs. Howard Wilson, Girl Scout director, accepted the campsite from the Elks and Miss Eileen McEown, scout director, announced the name of the camp. Girl Scouts sang the scout song and gave the scout promise, after which Father Callistus asked the benediction. The camp name was selected by the scouts.

First camping period began at once and periods will continue through the summer.
